Feline Infectious Peritonitis (FIP) at North Toronto Cat Rescue: A Financial Challenge in Our Continuous Fight to SAVE Lives

Over the last two years we've faced many overwhelming operational and financial challenges in our fight to save lives and stop incredible suffering but Feline Infectious Peritonitis (FIP) stands out above all others - a fatal viral disease that affects the immune system. Over 1 ½ years, the shelter experienced 13 of our rescues (Maddie, Polo, Charlie, River, Libby, Rascal, Alix, Felix, Lax, Duncan, Rufus, Annie, Smudge) all from many different locations (including two kitties brought to Toronto from Nepal by someone not originally connected to our organization). Recently a treatment break-through "surfaced" resulting in a high "cure" rate - after 84 days of dedicated treatment and \$4,500 per kitty (leaving us with \$58,500 in medical bills)!!! Watching young kitties morph from "barely able to lift their heads" to now "thriving and full of life and energy" gives us joy every single day. As a donation-funded rescue, we urgently need your support to continue covering medical costs and provide hope as we've done for over 36 years. We are all volunteers. They keep reminding us how much he has stolen their hearts with his loud and quirky vocalizations, always demanding their attention and affection and his nightly routine of snuggling between pillows and purring contentedly despite his notorious breath!! spite of being diagnosed with hyperthyroidism and arthritis, Hagrid's spirit shines - he wants to live - he's a true survivor. He's adapted to his daily medications and regular Vet visits - even earning a fan club at the Vet's office. It's difficult to imagine where he came from, how long it had been since his last meal and how many more days he might have lived to tell the tale, especially given his age and medical condition. 

From Tragedy to Triumph: Cedar's Journey of Survival and Healing

The first picture of Cedar when she arrived at the shelter - merely a kitten, found under a clump of cedars, in pain, alone, unable to move, possibly hit by a car and left to die like so many other stories we regularly hear weekly (as well as the often "demands" to run and help immediately on our own time and at our own expense). Her rescuer named her Cedar. We don't know how long she lay there but when found, she was dehydrated, hungry and weak and it was clear she had been in agony for several days and so very close to becoming another tragic loss. When Cedar came into our care, we rushed her for X-rays which confirmed she had a shattered hip. Options seemed slim - either pinning her hip (a Charity rate of \$10,000, not feasible with our funding) or trying quiet rest first (on the advice of a medical expert). With lots of love and care from our dedicated MusCATeers and regular Vet follow-up visits, this sweet young kitty miraculously healed on her own. Her story had a happy ending and she has recently been adopted and thriving in her furever home. There are many similar stories such as Cedar's but we can't do it alone. Funding is crucial. Without it, we can't cover high Vet bills or provide the everyday care our rescues need but we are blessed with amazing volunteers who believe each one deserves a chance and they are ALL SAFE with us. With your support, we can continue to save lives and give others from outside also a chance to heal and experience their own happy endings.

Operating a Shelter: What Does It Take?

Running a shelter is a monumental task that requires the dedication of many. Here's a glimpse into what it takes to keep our shelter running smoothly:

Volunteers: Ideally, we need about 56 volunteers per week just to clean the shelter, feed, and medicate the cats. This is based on having one feeder and three cleaners per shift, across two shifts per day, seven days a week.

Vet Runs: We make countless trips to the vet, both scheduled and urgent, to ensure our cats receive the care they need.

Laundry: The amount of bedding, linens and towels we go through each week is astounding!

Supplies Management: Keeping up with ordering food, medications and other essential supplies is a constant task.

Costco Runs: Monthly trips to Costco are necessary to stock up on litter and other supplies.

Communication: We receive and respond to numerous calls and emails about adoption requests and rescuing cats that people have found.

Adoption Process: Reviewing adoption applications and scheduling visits to the shelter is a vital part of finding our cats forever homes.

Volunteer Training: Canvassing for and training new volunteers ensures we have enough hands on deck to help.





Expense Management: We cover various expenses, including rent, utilities, Vet bills, medications and more.

Fundraising: Continuous efforts are essential to raise the funds needed to save as many furry friends as possible.

Determination: Above all, operating a shelter requires fierce determination and passion for the animals we serve!



SAFETY INDOORS WHAT A CAT MISSES!


- Encounters with wildlife, coyotes, foxes, raccoons and skunks.
- Being hit by a car
- Ingesting poisons such as antifreeze, rodent poison, etc.
- Being stolen / used for bait in dog fights
- Picking up multi-diseases: feline leukemia, FIV, etc.
- Fleas and ticks
- · Rain, snow, heat and cold
- Danger to other species (birds, squirrels, chipmunks etc.)
